Ainger Station, [Walton Twp]	From the Oaks & Folks book, Ainger Station photo with caption: Olivet Shuttle, operated between Olivet and Ainger Station", horses and buggy with people.
Ainger, [Walton Twp]	Ainger - From the 1883 Gazetteer book: Ainger, a recently established post office (1882) at Olivet Station, on the C. & G. T. Ry in Walton township, Eaton county, 7 1/2 miles southwest of Charlotte the county seat. Has a pop of 100, a brick yard, saw-mill and a grain elevator and ships brick and grain. Improved land \$45 to \$80 per acre/ Stage twice a day to Olivet, the nearest bank location, fare 25 cents. Telegraph, W. U. Carl F. Meads, postmaster.

Meads was first postmaster on March 16, 1882. About 7 years later, name was changed to THURMAN, then changed back to AINGER. In the 1870s it was known as OLIVET STATION. The AINGER post office was closed on Feb. 28, 1910. (SECT. 7/ 3).

The petitioners were poor penmen and the name misconstrued. That enactment has never been repealed but the name was never used in that form and Bellevue is doubtless now correct by "adverse possession" so to speak.

Williams, postmaster, physician and general store.
Brookfield Township	Brookfield Township is a General law township. From the internet: Municipalities and communities of Eaton County, Michigan.
Brookfield, [Brookfield Twp]	Brookfield - From the 1863-1864 Michigan State Gazetteer book: Brookfield, a township and post village of Eaton county, about 100 miles north-west of Detroit and 15 north of Albion state, on the Michigan Central railroad. (Note: According to an 1873 map, DUTTONVILLE (never had a post office) was right where BROOKFIELD was, probably a tiny settlement very close to BROOKFIELD.)

Brookfield, [Brookfield Twp]	BROOKFIELD. Per an 1873 state atlas, DUTTONVILLE was the town name, but BROOKFIELD was the post office name. Located in Section 21. IF THIS WAS THE CASE, it is not extremely unusual as quite often towns had two different names--one official and one unofficial. That is, one had a post office name and one had a "station" (or railroad) name. To make it clear, DUTTONVILLE never had a post office It was located in Section 21 (Brookfield Township).

Camp Creek, [Delta Twp]	CAMP CREEK. Tiny settlement, must have been located in Delta Twp., and probably in the northwest part. Its post office lasted about 6 years--from 1856 to 1862. First postmaster was Silas E. Millet.

We got through to Delta Mills at night of the third day after leaving Howell, and all found room to eat and to lie down in the spacious log house.
